GEORGE BECKER

U.S. NAVY, ELECTRICIAN'S MATE SECOND CLASS SERVED 1942-1946

NOMINATED BY MONROE COUNTY LEGISLATOR STEVE BREW

What inspired you to join the military?

I always wanted to join the Navy and serve my country. I enlisted when I was old enough at 17 years of age.

What moment in your service do you remember the most?

Two and half years in the South Pacific serving on the USS Emory, a destroyer escort ship, supporting our war effort and navigating through the huge typhoons.

What valuable lessons or skills did you learn from your time in the military? Respect authority, get along with people, be patient and appreciate what you have.

What do you love most about America?

Our freedom.

Nominators, what impact has the nominee had on your life?

I have known George for 30-plus years through his dedication and service to our community. He has inspired me and others to give back and serve our communities.

George was born on February 22, 1925 and turned 98 years young this year. He is in excellent health and lives independently with his family and neighbors keeping a caring and watchful eye out. George takes care of his house, including his large lawn, which he continues to mow.

George is a World War II veteran and member of The Greatest Generation. For his service, he received the World War II Victory Medal, American Campaign Medal, and Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal.









DAVID LEE BELL (HONORED POSTHUMOUSLY) U.S. MARINE CORPS, MASTER SERGEANT 21 YEARS OF SERVICE

Master Sergeant David Lee Bell passed away on August 18, 2023 and is recognized posthumously.

His nominator, Will Ambrose, shared:

David was active in the Canandaigua VFW, and he was recently recognized as the oldest surviving Vietnam veteran in the Canandaigua 2023 Memorial Day parade. I respect his commitment to his community and his work to support children.

Senator Helming respectfully shares this from Mr. Bell's obituary:

David's family moved into Ontario County over 200 years ago. He worked on the family farm, which is now part of Finger Lakes Community College. David retired as a Master Sergeant from the military after serving his country for over 21 years in both the Air Force and the Marines. He was a Vietnam vet, with three tours of duty in Vietnam. He also retired from Exxon/Mobil as a maintenance engineer and worked at Victor Hills Golf Club as a groundskeeper.

David was an active member of the Canandaigua Moose Club. For over 25 years, he worked year-round holding raffles and seeking donations for the Angel Tree Program, which he and his wife, Bernice, established. The collections and donations were used to obtain food, clothing and toys for the needy who may go without during the holidays. He worked with local school administrations to obtain a list of names in need of a little extra help during the holidays.

For over 65 years, David volunteered to work with children's charities, beginning with his time in the military. He never needed accolades or thanks, as he truly did it for the children.

Nominators, what impact has the nominee had on your life?

DANIEL BISSELL (HONORED POSTHUMOUSLY)

REVOLUTIONARY WAR VETERAN

NOMINATED BY DONALD V. HOYT III

Daniel Bissell, a Revolutionary War veteran, died in Richmond, NY in 1824 and is buried in Allens Hill Cemetery. His tombstone is inscribed, "In Memory of Daniel Bissell, Who Died August 21st, 1824, Aged 70 Years, He Had the Confidence of Washington From Whom He Received a Badge of Merit."

Mr. Bissell is considered to have been an inspiration for George Washington's design of the Purple Heart. He was a soldier and spy for the Continental Army during the American Revolutionary War, and he was awarded the Badge of Military Merit by General Washington.

As reported, on General Washington's direct orders, Mr. Bissell posed as a deserter and served in the British Army under Benedict Arnold in New York City from August 14, 1781 to September 29, 1782, relaying valuable information to the Continental command.

Washington is credited for designing the Purple Heart, but the design is said to have originated with Mr. Bissell. At a ball with Washington, Mr. Bissell was dancing with his future wife when he stepped on her purple dress and ripped a piece off. It's said that he took the piece of fabric, folded it into a heart, and told her to keep it. When Washington learned of this, he was inspired to make the Purple Heart.

During the Quasi-War with France (1798–1800), Mr. Bissell was commissioned as a first lieutenant in the 16th Infantry Regiment on March 3, 1799. He was discharged on June 15, 1800.

Mr. Donald V. Hoyt III shared, "As a student of history, the sacrifices of our forefathers in founding our great Nation inspires pride and respect. This gentleman was part of the inspiration for an award that no veteran wants to receive, but holds in high esteem when they are awarded one. As a U.S. Navy veteran, I'm extremely proud of those who came before me and left a rich legacy."









ROBERT CASE

U.S. AIR FORCE SERGEANT 4 YEARS OF SERVICE

NOMINATED BY

What inspired you to join the military? I was inspired in the aftermath of President Kennedy's assassination and decided to serve my country.

What moment in your service do you remember the most? I was part of a classified support operation that resulted in nine MiGs being shot down.

What valuable lessons or skills did you learn from your time in the military? Discipline and electronics.

What do you love most about America?

America is a free country.

Nominators, what impact has the nominee had on your life? We have been married for 58 years, and we have raised our children to respect our country and other people.

Robert spent 44 years with the fire service – 18 years as a volunteer firefighter, 20 years as a career firefighter, and six years as the City of Canandaigua Fire Chief.









CHRIS EDGERTON

U.S. AIR FORCE SENIOR MASTER SERGEANT (E-8) 24.5 YEARS OF SERVICE

NOMINATED BY

What inspired you to join the military? I had a calling for service and to start a new path in life.

What moment in your service do you remember the most?

Talking to an Afghan Air Force Security Forces officer after the fall of Kabul in 2021. I learned how he and his men utilized the training my team and I had given them and how that training saved their lives, helping them to evacuate HKIA/ Kabul while fighting the Taliban.

What valuable lessons or skills did you learn from your time in the military?

Never turn down an opportunity, especially one that you have sought out yourself.

What do you love most about America?

HOWARD M. HANCE (HONORED POSTHUMOUSLY) U.S. ARMY, CORPORAL SERVED 1941-1945

NOMINATED BY

MARION TOWN COUNCILMAN RON LONNEVILLE

Mr. Hance, a World War II veteran and member of The Greatest Generation, is recognized posthumously. Among his military honors, he received the Pearl Harbor Commemorative Medal.

His nominator, Ron Lonneville, shared:

It is with great honor as a patriotic American and Marion Town Board member that I posthumously nominate Corporal Howard Hance. As a lifelong resident of Marion, I have always known the Hance family. They have always been part of the fabric that held the Town together and made Marion prosper.

Howard graduated from Marion Central School. After his military service, he married and started a family in Marion. He worked for Sure Crop Fertilizers and Corenco Fertilizers. Al Curtis and Howard started the Snow White laundromat. Howard also served on the Marion Town Board.

Howard Hance was drafted in April 1941, before the United States was at war. He served in the U.S. Army and U.S. Army Air Corps. Trained as an infantryman, Hance received further training in repairing radar.

After basic training, Howard was stationed in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. On the morning of December 7, 1941, he went to Sunday morning church service. After the service and on his way back from breakfast, he recalled, "My buddies and I were swinging our mess tins around to get them to dry off, and BOOM." Howard and his fellow servicemen were confused as to what was going on. They would soon realize that this was the real deal.

Howard was assigned to an anti-aircraft battery on Hickam Field. His crew was credited with shooting down seven Japanese aircrafts. "It was awful, bodies were everywhere, in the water, some were in pieces." Howard survived the attack on Pearl Harbor and soon found himself in many spots around the Pacific repairing radar stations in places such as Guadalcanal, Guam, and other parts of the Philippines.

Howard returned to the United States to help train incoming troops and was stationed at Fort Jackson, South Carolina. Because he broke his ankle playing volleyball, he was spared from going to the Battle of the Bulge in Europe. Howard continued his service until the war ended in 1945.







ED HEMMINGER

U.S. AIR FORCE CHIEF MASTER SERGEANT 23 YEARS OF SERVICE

NOMINATED BY FARMINGTON TOWN SUPERVISOR PETER INGALSBE

What inspired you to join the military? Duty to our country during the Vietnam War.

What moment in your service do you remember the most? We created the first command post for the modern-day 1st Air Force.

What valuable lessons or skills did you learn from your time in the military? Leadership and time management.

What do you love most about America? Our freedom here in the United States.

Nominators, what impact has the nominee had on your life?

Above all, Ed is a charter member and Commander of Farmington AMVETS Post 332. He is a great leader and very concerned for local veterans' needs. He also serves on the Farmington Planning Board as Chairman and is an active member of the Farmington Board of Assessment Review.

Ed is a former Ontario County employee who managed the Axcess Ontario fiber ring in the County for many years. For his service, he received multiple Meritorious Service Medals.









JOHN DAVID KERR U.S. NAVY, HOSPITAL CORPSMAN SECOND CLASS SERVED 1966-1970 NOMINATED BY

CELINE-MARIE PASCALE AND BARBARA STAHL

What inspired you to join the military?

As a boy, I imagined a life as a pharmacist. When I got my second draft notice, I decided to make the most of the moment for myself and my country. I felt the Navy was my best choice because there was a good history of training, offering a medical position identified as Pharmacist Mate.

What moment in your service do you remember the most?

The first defining moment came when I arrived in Vietnam. I was sent to Hill 881, the first line of defense for the Khe Sanh Combat Base. On the third day of patrol, a fire fight broke out. Forty-three men went out; I was one of only seven to return to base. In the face of devastating losses, for the next month as the only corpsman for the company, I went on every patrol.

The second defining moment came during the Tet Offensive of 1968. For 77 days, the base of 5,500 Marines held against 20,000 North Vietnamese troops and relentless artillery bombardment. The horror, sacrifice and bravery of these moments shaped the rest of my life. Many years later, I was compelled to write my memoir, entitled *Breaking Silences: The Memoir of Hospital Corpsman HM2 John David Kerr at the Battle of Khe Sanh*. I wanted to recognize the bravery and sacrifice of the men with whom I served.

What valuable lessons or skills did you learn from your time in the military? Compassion, gratitude, and a continued desire to serve combat veterans. As a result of my experience, a career in medicine became obvious to me. As a psychiatric nurse for the Canandaigua VA, I spent my 46-year career caring for veterans who carried the heavy emotional and physical burdens of war. I learned that every day is a gift for having survived my time as a Combat Medic. I also recognized the power of service and fellowship.



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What do you love most about America?

I appreciate the freedom, opportunity and beauty that characterize the country.

Nominators, what impact has the nominee had on your life?

John is a good neighbor and friend and participates in the Really Reads Them Book Club. John is a humble, quiet man. In his actions, you will find a proud American whose faith in the country has only grown stronger as he served those badly wounded by our wars.

John's former colleagues at the Canandaigua VA praised his compassion and dedication as a staff member and a volunteer supporting veterans, having touched many lives. Among his military honors, John received two Presidential Unit Citations.









ANDREW KUJAWSKI

U.S. NAVY, E-7 21 YEARS OF SERVICE

NOMINATED BY

What inspired you to join the military? Family.

What moment in your service do you remember the most? My three combat tours.

What valuable lessons or skills did you learn from your time in the military? Learning to manage people.

What do you love most about America? Freedom.

Nominators, what impact has the nominee had on your life? Raising our family together, patriotism, and dedication to the country. We both have a long line of family who served this country and have done so with honor.

I suffer from PTSD, and while in combat, I remember situations where I thought I was going to die. I've learned humility, professionalism, and a desire to help the weak succeed.

What valuable lessons or skills did you learn from your time in the military?

The military taught me life lessons about perseverance that I have continued to use in civilian life. I now work for the Town of Victor and feel proud of my service in Afghanistan and Panama. I also was sent to assist during 9/11, the L.A. Riots, and Hurricane Wilma. I am a disabled combat veteran who still finds joy in serving my community.

What do you love most about America?

The freedom to choose how you want to live. In America, there is an opportunity for anyone who wants to work hard and do what it takes to be successful.

Nominators, what impact has the nominee had on your life?

Eric's whole life has been about serving the public and his country. He has selflessly dedicated his time so others can enjoy an easier, more comfortable way of life.
